City Council Meeting Minutes August 15, 2017 - 7:00 PM, City Hall Call to Order & Roll Call:

- Present were: Mayor Joyce Russell; Council Members: Tad Miller, Holly Lovik-Hanna, Nick Bailey, Cindy Peters, and Ron Rachut; City Clerk Wendy Lunning. Maintenance Manager Steve Roberts.
- Tad motioned, Cindy 2nd to approve the minutes of the July meeting. Unanimous
- Ron motioned, Nick 2nd to accept agenda with the addition of information on the School Election from Jaci Miller.
 Unanimous. Agendas are posted at City Hall, at the Library, and at the Post Office, 24 hours in advance of each Council Meeting. If you wish to be on the Agenda, please contact City Hall two days before the meeting.

School Election:

 Jaci Miller presented information regarding the special school election on Tuesday, September 12, 2017, voters will be asked to decide whether to approve a Physical Plant & Equipment Levy (PPEL) of not to exceed \$1.34/\$1,000 of assessed property value blended with an income surtax to begin on 7/1/2018 for the Forest City Community School District. She encourages everyone to vote.

Save Our Hospital:

• Teresa Nicholson ask for the City of Fertile supports for the efforts of Save Our Hospital Committee to maintain a full service acute care hospital in Albert Lea, MN. Ordinance Addition:

City Maintenance Report:

- Steve cleaned out drains on Main Street.
- Steve cleaned up trees at Ball Diamond, Streets, and Park Street.
- There have been problems at the sewer pumps. Hare Electric has
 ordered a new pump. The restored pump is not working properly
 and has been return for repair. The valve seal is leaking and Steve
 will be working with certified technician to get this repaired. It was
 suggested that the pumps be inspected annually.
- Steve is repairing the large ruts at the water plant.
- The new playground has been installed. The end support was damaged in the process. Boland Recreation said it will still be structurally okay. A big 'Thank you' to Nick, Allison, Ryan & Kelsey for helping Steve haul and level the pea gravel at the playground.
- Steve has ordered a new fire hydrant to replace the one by Fertile Church of Christ.
- There is a critter that is creating havoc at the ball diamond.
- City Council approved Steve to hunt at the lagoon.
- Steve set up and tore down tables, chairs, etc. for Fertile Days.
- Holly motioned, Nick 2nd to approve maintenance report. Unanimous

Mayor's Report:

- Joyce ordered signs for the pump house for Wellhead Protection Area as required by the DNR audit & Steve installed.
- Joyce continues to follow up with Ulland Brothers daily on when Main Street will be completed.
- Joyce is working with John Greve's, City Attorney, in regard to ¹
 Mayor serving as both Mayor and City Administrator. This was originally approved by the City Council in 2005.
- Thank You Warren Bruns for using their box scraper on circle drive in the park.
- A sincere 'Thank you' to Buck Russell for weed whacking in park by river banks and dike.
- Shingles blew off City Hall & Community Center. Joyce is working with insurance company and contractors to get estimates and to get repairs completed.
- The shelter house has been set up over the playground equipment.
- Joyce received letter from concerned citizen regarding getting Chris Hanna back on the Fire Department. This information has been shared with the Fire Chief.
- Joyce received letter from concerned citizen regarding the use of city equipment for personal use. Council agreed that use of city equipment for personal use should be brought to the council's attention prior to use.
- Council approved Wendy to make available a Complaint/Recommendation form. These will be available at City Hall and should be used to communicate with the Mayor and Council.
- Joyce called Green Canopy to clean handicap portable potty for the park on more regular basis.
- There has been too much infiltration in the sewer from possible sump pumps going into main sewer. Letters have been sent to residents to inspect houses per DNR.
- Joyce received funding for the WCDA grant for playground, shelter house and bronze statue.
- Joyce contacted Danko a/c the siren was not turning & has been repaired.
- Thank you, Fertile Fire Department, for cleaning off shelter houses, fireplace, band shell and tennis courts in park.
- Joyce approved Joely Bruns as new city library board member.
- State of Iowa is in process of city audit and we'll receive 'findings' on August 16th followed by a report.



Hello Fertile People:
By the time you read this, Fertile
Days will be over. I hope that you
had a chance to enjoy the two day
event. As usual, the committee
would like feedback on what you

liked or didn't like. All comments, either good or bad will be taken into consideration. We are already considering some additions for next year. Now the committee will look at your suggestions and start planning for our Spaghetti Supper in January. Say "thank you" to the committee members for their time and work. I couldn't be more pleased with our onion crop this year. Normally buy this time, we have tip burn (the top inch or two of the top) where the part of the top ws dead. This year they are up to my waist and green right to the top. The good weather is one factor and rotating fungicides and spraying, too. I took my first delivery of 88 lbs. of carrots and 100 lbs. of cabbage to Healthy Harvest of North Iowa on August 8. This will be weekly from now on through October. Some items I will run out of and others will come on board. Later I will have parsnips, rutabaga's and lots of green beans. If you are looking for vegetables for processing, give me a call. I might just have what you are looking for.

I went to a Mason City Council Listening Post on July 24. Bill Schickel (running for mayor) conducted it. Two things that really caught my ear were that 25% of the shopping malls in America will be closed in five years (think online). The other was the increasing demand for recreation. What this has to do with Fertile is the Winnebago River. Bill would like to see a water train from Fertile to Mason City. Others would like it to go from Minnesota to Rock Falls. Either way, they have to come out of the water at the dam. One side is our park; the other side is our community. This is a long term project involving land owners, the DNR, communities on the river and possible the state of lowa. It would be great to see people from outside the area use the river and spend some money in Fertile. It will take time, but is a doable project. Until next time, thank a farmer for the food on your plate, thank a veteran for the freedoms we enjoy, and above all, thank God for the blessings he has bestowed.

FERTILE FIRE

So here's the story I will pass along as it pertains to the past in the North Central lowa township of Fertile. Yes the town I make fun of for its quitting work traffic congestion & stuff. The event took place in 1932, before any of us were born so it is just another example of challenges faced by people in or around the township of Fertile, where there should be a sign telling people to proceed with caution.

Who Started the 1932 Fire?

In the 1920's and 30's it was not uncommon to hear the little town of Fertile referred to as the "Holy City". Of course, this was spoken in a rather light vain. However, it is ironic that what could have been one of the worst tragedies in the history of Worth County was narrowly averted in this very place.

This is a community that any parent would have been delighted to raise their family in, where school standards were exceedingly high, and the town's government was strict. Plus the fact that there were three active churches where most of the community was involved. Yes, it truly was a place where law & order & senior citizens were respected. Never the less, upon an unsuspecting village, on a cold, wintry night in March 1932, an "arsonist" crept into town with much vengeance in his heart, and not much thought of the heinous crime about to be committed.

S. W. (Sam) Wilds previously operated the Park Café on Main Street. (In the area of the Sandifer Building on the south side of Main Street). Because of his many encounters with the law over illegal and unlawful possession of intoxicating liquor, maintaining a liquor nuisance & violating the cigarette law. He was arrested for contempt of court, jailed and fined. Upon release from jail, Wilds was ordered to leave Worth County. Fertile residents shed no tears at his departure, but never realized they had not heard the last of Sam Wilds. Because of my desire to give an accurate account of what occurred on March 31, 1932, I visited the office of the Clerk of Court in Northwood, lowa, so the statements made, for most past are authentic.

According to the written testimony of Harley Wilds, who was living with his parents, Mr. & Mrs. S. W. Wilds in Thompson, Iowa on March 31, 1932 and this is the story he told. Same Wilds, along with Harley, left Thompson for Hanlontown & en-route decided to stop off at Forest City to buy kerosene and gasoline. Having brought a 5 gallon gas can and a 10 gallon cream can from home, Harley inquired, "what are we going to do"? Same Wilds replied, "I'll tell you later". They journeyed on to Hanlontown where they were seen by several residents. In fact, they visited men in the Barber shop & other places of business. Later that evening, as they started west on Hwy. 9, Sam informed his son, Harley, he wanted him to drive him to Fertile where he was going to burn down the café! After a period of time they went south of Fertile, circled back north just beyond the bridge by the park, where Sam Wilds proceeded to get out with the 2 cans, equipped with kerosene and gasoline. He ordered Harley to drive back to Hwy 9 & park on the east side of the intersection to await his return. On or near 2:30 am as the fire was becoming more and more visible, Wilds returned to his son & they drove west to their home in Thompson.

In the meantime, the Café's new owner, Melvin Oredsen, his wife Ethel and little son, Bobby, were asleep in the upstairs apartment. Also living in the apartment were his parents, Marius & Ida Oredsen & their 5 children, Hazel, Dorothea, Stanley, Donald & Edna Mae. All were sound asleep. Downstairs 2 local residences, Kenny Haugen & Ernie Jonson had been hired to wash the ceilings. Oswald Evenson, former owner of the café, also occupied sleeping quarters there. Suddenly they discovered the fire of the outside building. Flames were shooting higher & higher & windows were already starting to pop out. The 2 men immediately warned the Oredsen's & dressed only in night clothes they escaped either by stairway or through the window. One of the girls grabbed a pair of shoes & once on the ground ran to report the fire to the telephone office, quite a distance from the café. They also escaped unharmed. Both buildings burned to the ground & all furniture & clothing were a total loss, as well as the Oredsen's anniversary gifts. Next door to the café on the west side was an unoccupied small building & the Barber shop with living quarters in the one end. The building, also

threatened by the blaze, was owned and occupied by Mr. & Mrs. Charlie Eikenbary & family. Immediately they also prepared to move out, but a "bucket brigade" formed by local men managed to keep the fire under control & their building was saved. Neighbors & friends immediately opened up their homes to the Oredsens & others, until they could get situated in a different location.

We must make mention that suddenly as the fire was at its height, the wind changed. We want to acknowledge that the Lord intervened, saving the entire block from going up in smoke.

(2) later parts of the evening not reported were that it was Hazel who grabbed the pair of shoes, not knowing until later that they were not a pair, but one & the other from 2 sets of shoes & during the early escapes someone, probably Melvin, dropped Bobby from the second floor window to someone on the ground who caught him & took him to safely & Edna, only 7, burned her bare feet as she ran down the stairs to escape the fire.

Once again, returning to the incident on the night of the fire, E.W. Liley, Supt. of Schools, was returning the rather late hour from a meeting in Northwood. As he approached the intersection (Hwy 9 & Fertile turn-off), he noticed a parked car on the east side. His attention was called to a broken tail light on the 1928 Chevy. Later, upon learning of the fire the following morning, Mr. Lilley & Mayor Norman Jorgenson, returned to the very spot the car had been parked. They made plaster of Paris molds of the tire marks. Then they proceeded to do the same thing with the tracks of the car that had turned around south of the bridge by the park. They were identical.

I especially took note of the fact that within 2 days after the fire, the Wilds son, Harley, went for a ride with his brother and that he told his brother what their father had done that night in Fertile. Together they decided to drive to Fertile & check the damage done for themselves.

Soon afterwards S.W. Wilds was arrested, accused of willfully & maliciously setting fire to & burning the dwelling house occupied by Melvin Oredsen. 36 witnesses were subpoenaed to testify. Several stated that Sam Wilds had made threats to get even with people in Fertile, including Charlie Eikenbary & the fellows across the street. He also remarked, "I have never met a man I couldn't get even with." The trial date was set for July 1932 & Wilds was brought up from Anamosa. L. Boomhower of Mason City was his attorney & many local citizens were acquainted with him. Neither the cans found in the ashes & exhibited at the trial or the explicit account told by his son Harley, (which was clear cut and honest) convinced the jurors of anything other than circumstantial evidence & Mr. Wilds was declared not guilty!! The only sentence handed down to Sam Wilds was for carrying a concealed weapon. He did have a lengthy stay in the State Penitentiary.

It was interesting to see Sam Wilds hand written letter addressed "to whom it may concern." He stated that he was only carrying the gun (tied to his neck and pinned in his underwear) in case the jury found him guilty of a crime he did not commit - he then planned suicide.

Once again we reiterate the testimony of many local people who heard Same Wilds make treats about "getting even". The scripture that comes to my remembrance is the last part of Matthew 12:34 which reads, "for out of the abundance of the heart, the mouth speaketh".

So, another chapter of the event which occurred on March 31, 1932 came to a close. In our finite minds we do not understand a court system or the justice of it all & even though most of us are satisfied that we know the truth, yet there will always be some who are still questioning – who really started the fire?

I ain't gonna need this house no longer I'm gettin' ready to meet the saints


This ole house once I knew my children this house once I knew my wife

I returned from California many an April and autumn to ready my Mother's house for summer and winter. One summer we re-shingled the one story wing and another time I repaired both the basement door and the back door off the kitchen. The original log sill placed there in 1880 had rotted out and was sagging. In the old days I would have visited the Fertile Lumber Company for materials, but it took a trip to "Mason" that year. I have a handful of the old original square-cut nails salvaged from that project.

The winter photo above is copied from a postcard mailed in 1911. The angle indicates it was probably taken from the third story west window of the mill. The old wooden school house and the Lutheran church can be seen in the background. I find the horse-drawn sled on the snowy street especially nostalgic.

Back to the old house – I received a nice letter from Sara Innes who lives across the street and purchased the lot after the house burned. She wrote that those who demolished the structure said the wood framing was fragile and almost fell apart when they touched it. Sounds like "she trembled in the darkness oh when the lightnin' walked about," as Johnny would sing.

I recollect the Calhoons once occupied the old house and I remember visiting there with my parents when Hank and Janet Van den Bosch lived there. Ernie and Vesta purchased the place in 1957 because it was just across the street, "catty-corner" from his garage. My three children spent the summer there with their grandparents in 1964. For nine weeks they got to experience for the first time what small town living was like. The last time they visited that old house was when my mother passed in 2001.

A television program airs in Los Angeles featuring "things that aren't here anymore." This old house, Dad's first garage, the brick school house and gym and Grandpa Kuns' farmstead northwest of Forest City all fit into that category. For me they are gone but not forgotten.





Chicken Salad Stuffed Tomatoes Recipe

1 pound boiled chicken breast, cut into ½-inch pieces

1 cup chopped celery

4 spring onions, chopped

1 cup mayonnaise

1/2 teaspoon celery salt

1/2 cup sliced almonds

8-10 medium tomatoes, cored

Stir together chicken, celery, onions, mayonnaise, celery salt and almonds. Scoop into cored tomatoes and serve cold.

TUNA STUFFED TOMATOES

4 large firm-ripe tomatoes, peeled

2 cans (6 1/2 or 7 ounces each) tuna

1/3 cup mayonnaise

2 tablespoons lemon juice

1/2 cup chopped cucumber, drained

2 teaspoons chopped onion

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/2 teaspoon dried leaf tarragon

Place tomato stem side down. Make 6 vertical cuts almost through tomato to form 6 petals.

Using a teaspoon, scoop out pulp from tomato, reserving pulp for later use in sauce or other recipe. Drain. Cover and refrigerate tomato until firm. Combine remaining ingredients in a medium bowl; refrigerate for 1 hour to allow flavors to blend before filling tomatoes. Stuff at serving time.

Just a few lines to let you know I'm still alive. I am writing this letter slowly because I know you cannot read fast. You won't know the house when you come home --- we've moved.

About your father - he has a lovely new job. He has five hundred men under him. He is cutting grass at the cemetery. There was a washing machine in the new house when we moved in, but it isn't working very good. Last week I put fourteen shirts into it, pulled the chain, and I have not seen the shirts since.

Your uncle Dick drowned last week in a vat of whiskey in Dublin Brewery. Some of his workmates dived in to save him, but he fought them off bravely. We cremated his body and it took three days to put out the fire.

Your father didn't have much to drink at Christmas. I put a bottle of castor oil in his pint of beer - it kept him going til New Year's Day.

I went to the doctor on Thursday and your father came with me. The doctor put a small tube into my mouth and told me to keep it shut for ten minutes. Your father offered to buy it from him.

IT only rained twice last week. First was three days and then for four days. Monday it was so windy that one of our chickens laid the same egg four times.

Much love, Mother P.S. I was going to send you ten dollars, but I had already sealed the envelope.


