HISTORY OF FERTILE, IOWA

The first settler in Fertile Township was William Rhodes who came to Iowa in 1856 at the age of nineteen and after stopping in Charles City for a short time, came to Fertile Township. While he was in Mason City he became acquainted with a man, who in conversation, told him of the existence of a mill site in this locality and he started out on a voyage of discovery. When he arrived at the spot which was at or near the present site of the village of Fertile, he admired the location. He had no measuring rod to determine how much back water he would have, so using his height as a guide, he tied sticks together and sighted the distance, placing them an equal distance apart. Through this procedure he found he could back the water around the curve three-fourths of a mile and this would take care of a 10-foot dam.

Late that evening he was preparing his supper over a crude fireplace he had made by digging a hole and placing stones in and around it. His coffee was boiling and his potatoes frying in the pan when he looked up and saw two Indians watching him. He became frightened but managed by his motions to show them he was cooking his meal. They nodded their heads and left. He was very uneasy and spent a restless night rolled up in his blanket among some bushes. The next morning he was up with the sun and left the locality.

He returned to Charles City, and making the necessary arrangements, purchased tools, supplies, etc., loaded up a wagon drawn by oxen and started back to the location and arrived August 6, 1856.

His first labor was to build a grindstone frame to grind his scythe that he might cut grass for his oxen.

Here he erected a humble log cabin, going to Owens Grove in Cerro Gordo County for lumber to roof it in. His home was 14x18 feet in size with a Dutch fireplace at one end. When he

had occasion to be absent from home it was his custom to chalk upon the door, "Walk in and help yourself." This fall deer were plentiful, wild fruits of all kinds were abundant, and he lived "in clover" as the saying is.

Mr. Rhodes was at this time a single man. The grateful wayfarers that often took advantage of his hospitality and used his cabin when he was absent would, in return for this accommodation, leave a note with their name and a gift of bacon or venison. He had the names of many people he never, saw or knew.

Soon after completing his house he commenced to put in a dam across the creek for his mill, which was the first saw mill in the county. He had this completed and his saw mill ready for operation by the next July. He ran this mill until the spring of 1858 with quite a degree of success, when high water cut around the south end of the dam. Business was compelled to halt for a short time while this was repaired. He had obtained the order to saw the lumber for the new Court House in Mason City, and when the dam had again been cut away by high

water he had to cancel this large order. This year of 1858 was known to all the old settlers as the "wet season" and Lime Creek was not fordable at any time during that summer, so repairs had to wait until the following winter. In the latter part of February, 1859, he got some help, cut out the ice in the creek and extended his mill dam 50 feet. This dam held until 1929 when high water washed it out.

He was married on July 5, 1859, to Hannah Pence. August 22, 1862, he enlisted in Co. B, 32nd Iowa, Infantry. He was discharged in 1865 and returned to his home in Fertile, Iowa, where his wife and baby, John Fenton, had remained with her parents. John Fenton was the first white child born here.

In 1868 he erected a grist mill to replace the saw mill. This building was 34x42 feet and 2½ stories high and had the capacity of turning out some 50 barrels of first class flour a day. The key to the first mill is a prized possession of Mr. and Mrs. James Ouverson.

The next to arrive and settle near here were William K. Fankell and his brother-in-law E. S. Winans in 1857.

These were all the settlers until 1865 when Henry and Charles Platts settled here.

An early incident in Mr. Rhodes' life was a funeral attended by 12 people in all. Andrew Peter Nelson died and his coffin was the wagon box he built for the covered wagon, in which his family arrived. His grave was the cellar he dug for the cabin he intended to build for his family. A cemetery was started here and a church established later on.

"COLOMA PETE"

The old timers of Fertile have discussed this old character many times while sitting around on cracker barrels at Andrew Grove's store. His real name has vanished but he was known as Coloma Pete because he told of being in the California Gold Rush and of panning gold in Coloma County. He came to Fertile as a teamster on a freight outfit shortly after the Civil War and decided to stay. He was tall and erect with iron gray hair hanging down over his shoulders and had a bushy beard. He lived in a cabin North of the mill and supported himself by trapping and fishing. One day he paid for his supplies with gold dust. He had approximately \$80 in gold and did not tell where he found it. Soon people followed him and found that he walked three miles east of Fertile to Willow Creek which runs into the Winnebago River. He soon discovered the people watching him and was much amused as he watched them try to find gold. The excitement soon died down as young and old tried their skill and failed to find gold. He told them that there was so little gold there that only an expert like himself could find it.

He died in his cabin one night in 1877 or 1878. His rifle is still in the community and is a muzzle loading, percussion Kentucky type.
