You will radiate with beauty As the young and the very old Are captured in your spell, While the witching hours unfold.





Orcutts on Grant Run Many Years

Frank Orcutt couldn't remember just how many years he has been threshing. He started when he was a boy. He runs the separator and is tightening a grease cup in the picture as he leans down over a maze of belts. His is a job for a careful man.

Frank and his brother, Bernard, own the threshing rig. Bernard is shown sitting on the tractor which provides power for the big separator.

The tractor is an old Rumely 6 with 50 horsepower on the belt. The Orcutt brothers bought it after it had served a term in the quarry at Fertile which later was electrified.

The tractor is an old one but a considerable improvement over the old time steam engine, Bernard admitted. He recalled how the machine men had to get up early in the morning to get steam up for threshing. The farmer had to make a trip to town for jag of coal to run the engine. Water always had to be provided and it took and extra man to haul it.

The steam engine was heavy, too. And in the days of steam engines bridges were not built for the heavy loads which trucks haul on modern roads. Quite often bridges collapsed under the engine or separator even though an extra 2 miles was traveled often to avoid a bridge that was known to be weak.

Just the same, Bernard admitted he'd like to see one of the old engines. They were much more fascinating machines than the modern tractors. There noisy chugging and smoke pouring out of the stack made them somehow seem more alive than a tractor. Besides, a tractor can't whistle.


