CITY COUNCIL NEWS

The Fertile City council met May 7, 2002 at 7:00 pm in Fertile City Hall, 105 West Main. Purpose of the meeting was a Public Hearing on the proposal to adopt a Floodplain Management Ordinance, a Restricted Residential District Ordinance, and the Fertile Code of Ordinances, 2002. The regular council meeting was also held. Present at the meeting were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Jeff Berg, Tad Miller, Tammy Hall, Tanya Olson and Richard Bruns. Also present were Tom Kirschbaum, Chris Diggens, Randy Finholt, Mark Hicks, Carollyn Nedved, Evelyn Elthon, Lois Anderson, Ruth B. Ouverson, Cliff Petersen, Lee Briggeman, Goldie Felland, Charlie Nye, Dan Miller, Loris Scobee, Chris Andersen, Kristen Andersen Fred Hare, Catherine Kirschbaum, Ed Buchanan, Chuck Waage, Keith Brcka, John Kirschbaum, Eric Kirschbaum, Penny Miller, Joan Norem. The minutes were without objection and declared approved as presented. Randy Finholt, Rural Development Specialist was present to offer grant writing assistance to help get the sewer system in compliance with our DNR permit. Olson moved, Berg 2nd to proceed with Mr. Finholt and the application process for assistance. Passed. Mark Hicks representing Heartland Asphalt gave a written estimate on summer street repair. Mr. Hicks stated that his company also does manhole work and will be willing to give estimate for this project. A public hearing was held on the Flood Plain Management Ordinance was held. Charilie Nye stated he did not believe Fertile has ever flooded north of the river and should not be in a flood plain. Goldie Felland questioned whether insurance rates will go up.

Cathy Kirschbaum stated that insurance costs will increase for people who must purchase flood insurance.

Hall stated that banks will not loan money to anyone who buys a home in the floodplain unless they have flood insurance. Hall moved to close the public hearing, Olson 2nd, Passed. A public hearing on the Restricted Residential District Ordinance was held. This ordinance restricts businesses to a determined are of the City. If a business wishes to locate outside of the area, the business must come to the City Council to request a variance, the neighbors will be notified and will have an opportunity to make comment before the council acts. Miller moved to close the public hearing. Hall 2nd. Passed. The 2002 Code of Ordinances public hearing was held. Evelyn Elthon pointed out a clerical error which will be corrected. Felland and Lee Briggeman also requested information on the ordinances. Hall moved to close the meeting. Miller 2nd.Passed. Olson moved to pass the Flood Plain Ordinance, Hall 2nd, Passed. Olson moved to waive the 2nd and 3rd reading of the Flood Plain Ordinance. Passed.. Olson moved to approve the resolution for NFIP, Hall 2nd. Passed. Hall moved, Bruns 2nd to approve the application to NFIP. Passed. Hall moved to adopt the Restricted Residential Ordinance. Hall, Olson, Miller voted yes, Bruns, Berg no. Hall moved to waive the 2nd and 3rd reading of the Restricted Residential Ordinance, Olson 2nd. Hall, Olson, Miller yes, Bruns, Berg no. Hall moved to approve final passage and to file the Restricted Residential Ordinance, Olson 2nd. Hall, Olson, Miller yes, Bruns, Berg no. A motion to adopt the 2002 Code of Ordinances by Bruns, Hall 2nd. Passed 5-0. Olson moved to waive the 2nd & 3rd reading of the 2002 Code of Ordinances, Hall 2nd. Passed 5-0. Mayor Russell and the city clerk signed the new ordinances. Dan Miller protested his water bill, Miller moved Hall 2nd to forgive Dan Miller

water bill for January and February. Passed 4 yes, Bruns abstained. Ed Buchanan will present a bill for fence repair for damage caused in the demolition of the old school. Damages will be paid and the bill will be turned over to Nettleton, who did the demolition. The Concerned Citizens of Fertile voiced concern about who could participate in the FB&I. The Concerned Citizens of Fertile stated the bids on the Fertile Walking Bridge were not proper and requested the City Council to make the decision on the Fertile Walking Bridge. It was decided to hold a special council meeting Thursday May 16, 2002 at 7:00PM in the Fertile Community Center, 508 West Washington to allow the Fertile FB&I to present the bids and the recommendation of their selection to the council. The clerk will post the notice. The FB&I Chair elected not to make a report at this time. The clerk called attention to the financial report 7-1-01 thru 4-30-02. Fred Hare explained to the council the problem with the circuit boards at the sewer system. Berg moved to have Hare order parts to repair the system, Hall 2nd. Passed. Tom was directed to call Dave at Heartland to see about uncovering and raising the manholes. The inspection planned for May 11, 2002 will not be done since the manholes are under street tar and sealcoat and will need to be opened and raised. All Manholes must be inspected at the same period of time. The inspection is necessary to come into compliance with the DNR permit. Bruns will continue to investigate the moving of the LP Tank at the Lagoon. It cannot be moved when it is full. Burning at the lagoon cannot be done until the tank has been moved. The watertower will be painted this summer. One-half payment will be made this year, one- half next year. Motion to table the tree trimming project was made by Berg. 2nd Bruns. Olson moved, Hall 2nd to have a City Audit done. Passed. An audit firm has not been selected. Tom and John Kirschbaum of Cherry Tree Builders made an offer to purchase the Gym at the community center. The council will have a Public Hearing on the proposal of what to do with the Community Center on May 16, 2002 at 7:00 PM at the Community Center, 508 West Washington. The public hearing will begin immediately following the special council meeting. Moved by Berg, 2nd Hall. Passed. Clerk will post. The new ordinances ban open burning except for Spring and Fall. The Mayor set the date for lawn refuse burning for April 1 thru May 31. Buck Russell was authorized to mow for the city during the time Dennis Ganz was on vacation at \$10.00 an hour. Joan Norem was present to present the City insurance . Olson moved to pay, Berg 2nd. Passed. The clerk was directed to publish the water rates in the Fertile Reminder. If anyone feels their utility bill is in error, please contact the clerk at City Hall. Meeting Adjourned.

Clarence Neil L. Kuns June 21, 1994

Earlier this spring my mother told me that Clarence (Ouverson) had stopped by to plow her garden. He has done this for more years than I can remember and also services her car, changes the oil and makes minor repairs. Clarence has cared for "winterizing" her house each Fall for at least a decade. Perhaps it is because his wife Ruthie is Mom's niece, but I think there is more to his thoughtfulness than kinship.

Every Fall fifty years ago Clarence delivered corn cobs to Grandma Carr. After he had shelled his field corn Clarence would bring a load of the cobs to Grandma's house and put them into her wood shed. The price was right -- they were free -- and Grandma always appreciated the gesture. She used them as fuel for cooking and heating. While cobs burned more quickly than wood, they did provide good heat, and were easier to handle than kindling. She could hustle a hod of cobs into the house by herself if no grandchildren were available to do so.

But *my* grandma was *Ruthie's* grandma also, so it could be argued that this generosity was still a "relative" thing. Perhaps. I recall another incident which was unrelated to our extended family, and demonstrated the man's generosity. These days farmers have computerized their operations and can quickly determine when some part of their business is no longer profitable. Fifty years ago it wasn't always that simple to make such judgements. Still, it didn't take too much thought to figure out that chickens which stopped laying eggs during the Winter still had to be fed, and that this was not a money making proposition. After egg production declined many of the farmers would sell or butcher their layers and can or eat the meat. Iowa suddenly became the land flowing with chicken and noodles or dumplings. It was a delicious time to be alive.

One of the women in town was enduring a bad experience in her marriage. Her husband was out of circulation because of his conviction of some illegal activity. She was trying to eke out a living for her family in his absence. Everyone in town understood her plight and tried to help her. Clarence told her he was thinning out his chickens, and asked her if she would like to have a few. Her reply was one of the most classic "welfare mentality" answers of which I've ever heard. She is reported to have said, "Well, I guess I could use two or three if you would kill them and clean them for me."

Only foxes and weasels killed chickens for fun, and "cleaning" them entailed plucking the feathers (all of them) cutting open the gut and removing the entrails. It was a smelly job, but most hungry people put up with the chore in anticipation of the much more pleasant taste and smell of fried chicken.

Clarence's reply is not on the record. My guess is that the lady still got her chickens, whether or not she really appreciated the offer. Certain people are harder to help than are others. There are people who even look gift *chickens* in the mouth.

I suppose everyone who has ever tried to be generous could tell a similar story. Some would use such an incident to turn off the tap of their generosity. Those who continue trying to help understand that it really is more blessed to give than to receive.

Number Four:

Rhubarb Cake

2 cups finely chopped rhubarb 1 tsp. Cinnamon 1/2 cup white sugar 1/2 tsp. Nutmeg 1/2 cup butter (Oleo) 1 ap buttermilk 1 1/2 cups white sugar 1/2 flaked coconut 1/2 chopped 2 eggs almonds 1 tsp vanilla 2 1/8 cups flour 4 tbs. Flour 1 tsp Baking Soda 4 tSp. Brown sugar 1/2 tsp. Salt 4 thesp butter (oleo)

Preheat oven to 350°. Grease & flour a 9x13 cake pan. In a small bowl, mix chopped rhubarb with 1/2 cup surgar; set aside. Sift together flour, baking soda, salt. Cinnamon & nutmeg. Set aside. In large bowl, cram the butter (1/2 c.) and 1 1/2 c. sugar unt light and fluffy. Beat eggs one at a time, add vanilla. Beat in flour mixture alternately with buttermilk. Fold in the rhubarb mixture. Add coconut (optional) and chopped nuts.

*For a streusel topping: combine 4 tbsp. Flour, 4 tbsp. brown sugar. Cut in butter (Oleo) until it resembles coarse crumbs. Sprinkle on top of cakee.

Bake in preheated oven for 30-35 minutes, or until toothpick inserted into the center of cake comes out clean. C.001.
