A resolution to adopt the comprehensive solid waste reduction plan for the city was passed. Matt Berry of Clear Lake was appointed City Attorney. Berg presented the budget for the Fire Department. A contract with Brian Nettleton for \$5,950.00 To bury the old school rubble was approved. The January expenditures were approved. February 11, 2002

The Valve Job March 22, 1994 Neil L. Kuns

Most men want their sons to follow in their footsteps. Dad never told me that, but he did give me the opportunity to learn much of what he had become so skilled at doing mechanically. I pumped gasoline, washed windshields, checked oil levels in engines and put air in tires. He taught me to grease the chassis and to *always* replace the drain plug when changing oil in cars before replacing the oil. One has to drain a gallon of Quaker State *through* an engine and *onto* the floor only *once* to learn that lesson. I also learned to sharpen tools, to clean parts of motors being repaired, and to operate the metal lathe. In time Dad trusted me to repair tires and to reline brakes.

During the summer of 1948 he asked me if I wanted to grind the valves of a 1936 Plymouth which was coming into the shop the next week. If *he* thought I could do it, *I* thought I could do it, and agreed to give it a try. I knew that if I ran into any trouble he would be there to bail me out. The whole job was my responsibility. I removed the rocker arm cover, took off the head, and broke down the parts, keeping the valves in their proper order in one of those advertising yard sticks with holes, designed for that purpose.

The head valves had to be ground to an exact angle, but there was a precision grinder to do that. One by one I chucked them into the machine and dressed them on the Carborundum wheel until all burning and the part must be replaced. When this part the head had to be ground. Again there was a tool made for that purpose, and I polished off all twelve places. Having "lapped in" each valve to its seat with a fine grinding compound, I was ready to replace the keepers and springs, and to re-assemble the rocker arm and adjust the valves to their proper clearances.

I finished all this late on a Saturday afternoon, and didn't have time to start the engine and see if it would run before it was time to close up shop and go home. We were going to Boy Scout Camp the next afternoon, and I really wanted to see how it worked before leaving.

I was feeling good about having completed the job until I returned to the bench at which I had been working. There was a single lonely bench among the tools. Could I *really* have reassembled the motor, leaving out such an important part? Many years later in life I learned that sometimes distracted by the instructor, and given an extra wheel during the time they were re-assembling a clock to teach them observation wheel belong? I never knew if Dad had put the valve there all along. I worried about it all week at camp, and the first question I asked after arriving home was about the Plymouth. The motor did run smoothly. It was a job I've never forgotten.

COOKS' CORNER

CROCK POT PIZZA

(or cook in a low (250° oven 3-4 hours)

- 12 oz package wide egg noodles (homemade style) 1/4 pounds ground beef (pork)
- 1/4 cup chopped onion
- 1, 28 oz. Jar spaghetti sauce
- 1 small jar sliced mushrooms
- 1 package sliced pepperoni/Canadian bacon (use amount your family likes)
- 3 cups shredded mozzarella cheese
- 3 cups shredded cheddar cheese
- Italian seasoning to taste

Cook noodles according to package directions. In a large skillet, cook beef/pork and onions until no longer pink. Drain.

Stir in spaghetti sauce, mushrooms and Italian seasoning. Drain cooked noodles. Spread one-third of meat, including pepperoni/Canadian bacon, in a 5 quart slow cooker (roaster pan-cake pan) coated with non-stick cooking spray.

Cover with a third of the cheeses. Repeat layers twice.

Cover and cook 3-4 hours on low or until heated through and cheese is melted.
