Up in the Air Neil L. Kuns September 24, 1993

My first recollection of seeing an airplane was over the pasture north of the mouth of Beaver Creek. Grandma Carr and I were on our way to the creek to trap minnows for a fishing expedition. She told me it was probably a mail plane (it probably *wasn't*) because Air Mail was new in those days. I remember hollering at the top of my lungs, "Give me a ride!", but the yellow bi-plane just kept flying away into the west. A few years later when I tried nailing five inch lengths of lath together to make a toy airplane I made sure to paint it *yellow*, like the first one in my memory.

During my high school years I became interested in photography and spent some of my hard-earned money to buy a 35 millimeter camera. It was a used, German made, folding bellows *Balda Jubilette*, with a scratch on the lens. I shot everything in sight, and read my "How to take Good Photos" book from cover to cover. Unlike one of the bachelor farmers in the area who also had a 35 mm camera and took pictures for awhile but gave up when he "ran out of things to shoot" (as he told me), I could always see a picture, waiting to be taken.

After I saw my first aerial photograph the desire arose to take some pictures of the whole town of Fertile from the air. I began to talk about it at home, and Dad told me Alf Prestholt, a farmer who lived a couple miles east of town, had a plane and might be willing to take me up if I asked him. I went out to see him, explained what I wanted, and was delighted that he was willing to help me up. We set the day and time.

Early one summer evening I drove out to his pasture airstrip, and helped him pull his *yellow* Piper Cub out of a shed. He checked it out, set the brakes, invited me to get into the front seat, propped the engine to start it, climbed in and off we went, bumping along the pasture until it gained enough speed to take off. What exhilaration!

We climbed to about 1500 or 2000 feet as we headed west toward town. Sunlight was failing and I had to shoot quickly. This camera had no built-in light meter, so I had to estimate the exposure time. It also had to be recocked after each shot. The engine of the Piper was so loud that I couldn't hear the shutter click, and I was so excited that I couldn't remember cocking the shutter after any of the shots. It turned out that habit was ingrained enough to take care of all this and every exposure was good. After twenty-five minutes I knew what Fertile looked like from up in the air.

During the 1960's I learned to fly and got my private pilot's license. I have hundreds of hours at the "stick", and have also flown tens of thousands of miles in commercial air liners, but not one of those flights was as exciting as the day Alf Prestholt "gave me a ride". Worth County Transit is pleased to have the opportunity to serve you. Due to the numerous governmental cuts to balance the state budget, we will have to make some changes in our local service.

We will continue with the same fares as last year. We will continue to honor silver advantage and cancer tickets.

We must, however, have more passengers on each bus when we commute. We are required to reduce the number of trips we make. To be able to continue to provide the same level of service, we will have a more scheduled run system. We ask that you use this schedule when you plan your appointments and outings. This will reduce the amount of time you should need to ride on the bus and the length of time you will wait to be transported home.

The following is an outline of the times the bus hopes to follow. Keep in mind that the more riders that are scheduled in an area will cause the drivers to be off schedule from time to time. This is an approximate time that we aim for to get into Mason City: 8 a.m., 10:30 a.m. & 1:00 p.m.

Return trips are anticipated out of Mason City at:

8:30 a.m., 11:00 a.m., 1:30 p.m. & 4:00 p.m. The final bus will leave Mason City around 3:45 to transport home. This route will be a longer ride, as it will go through Fertile before coming into Northwood. We realize this wil' times be an inconvenience and we hope to make this transition as smooth as possible.

Our dispatchers at Worth County Transit will assist you with an appointment change if necessary so your needs can be met. If you need to leave the Worth or Cerro Gordo County area, our dispatchers will line up linkage with that county transit service to assist you. We look forward to serving you in the next year!

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FERTILE FIRE DEPARTMENT

It has come to our attention that some people are concerned about which ambulance service will respond to their address in an emergency. When wonderful 911 system was set up, a decision was based upon response time, mileage and training for the responding ambulance service we use.

For some individuals, an alternative preference may be requested based upon personal choice; you have the option of doing this. In our Fertile Fire District a 911 emergency call for medical assistance will alert the dispatcher to page out our department along with ambulance service. A predetermined ambulance service is automatically dispatched unless the caller requests another. We have continuing service with Snell's and the Forest City Ambulance services, with no complaints.

In the 911 computer system, you address and/or phone number displays information, allowing the dispatcher to determine which emergency services are needed for your specific crisis. If you are unsure of who will respond, contact the Sheriff's Department using their **Non-Emergency phone number** and ask their dispatcher to verify for you. In **Cerro Gordo County** that number is **641-421-3000**, for **Worth County** that number is **1-324-2481**.

In the event that your address is currently set up for a non-preferred ambulance service of your choice, you may switch the predetermined service to one you prefer. This may be done for any one address, for or by the current tenant/property owner only. Contact your County EMS Director to make these changes for you, the Sheriff's Department can help you reach them.

As always, please feel free to contact a Fertile Fire Department Volunteer for more information. We are happy to serve you, and again, **Thank You** for your continued support.

The Foot bridge was installed Monday, July 29, 2002. It is a prefabricated bridge from The Continental Bridge Company, Alexandria, Minnesota, North America's largest manufacturer of prefabricated bridges. It is made of atmospheric corrosion resistant steel, which gives it a natural rustic look. It is ideally suited for parks and is appreciated for its low maintenance requirements. SWEET PICKLE RELISH

- 3 quarts cucumbers---chopped
- 2 cups chopped onions
- 1 cup chopped red pepper (for color)
- 1/3 cup pickling salt
- 3 cups sugar
- 3 cups vinegar
- 2 teaspoon celery seed
- 1/2 to 1 teaspoon tumeric

Put onions and peppers in a pan, stir in salt and 1 1/2 quarts water. Let stand 3 to 4 hours. Drain. Heat sugar, celery seed, tumeric and vinegar. Boil for 10 minutes. Stir every so often while cooking. Seal in sterile jars.
