Death of a Hired Man Neil L. Kuns March 27, 1995

Every small businessman or proprietor faces a dilemma as his business grows. "Should I hire more workers or take in only the business I can handle myself?" Dad usually had at least one hired man, and sometimes enjoyed enough business to keep two mechanics as busy as he was himself. All this was in addition to what little work he was able to get out of me and, later, my brother Dale.

I remember the hired men and their peculiarities quite well. Ed Shinn had a good sense of humor, but sometimes tended to be pessimistic. This trait took its toll on his "tummy." He always had indigestion, and was forever popping Bromo Seltzer into a glass of water and gulping it down. His cobalt-blue Bromo bottle was ever within easy reach, and he took the preparation as regularly as his smokes or his Cokes. In spite of all this he seemed to be a good worker. Dad kept him on until he moved back home to Mason City.

Norman Nye also worked at the garage for awhile. Because I was fascinated with airplanes, I was enthralled when he stored his biplane in the back room of the garage for several months. That whole matter is another story for another time, however.

Another of Dad's hired men was Don Aspland, formerly a mechanic in the Air Force. Don was from Burchinal, Iowa, and had married Dorothy Nissen, my mother's niece. He was like family as well as an employee but this dual role never seemed to be a problem. Although Don was quiet and reserved, he too had a quick sense of humor. Dorothy was much shorter than Don, and could hardly see over the steering wheel when she drove. Once when she came driving down the street in his car he quipped, "Here comes my car without any driver." Don was a good mechanic and a steady worker as long as he stayed well.

In the fall of 1946 Don began to suffer from pain and weakness. He was soon diagnosed as having Hodgkin's Disease, a cancer of the lymph system. His lymph nodes would swell and become extremely painful. In those days treatment amounted to little more that narcotics to mask the pain. Over his last months of life the suffering became more and more un-bearable. One of his cousins came regularly to give him his morphine shots, but even then Don had to be tied to his bed to keep him under control. Don died before his thirtieth birthday, leaving Dorothy and their young daughter, Kay. During his illness both my mother and father called in their tiny home and offered whatever help they could. This was probably the first time I realized how difficult life sometimes is, how helpless friends and family can be to do anything to ease the suffering, and how death, as dreadful as it seems to be, can be a release and a blessing.
