The Fertile City Council met April 6, 2004 at 7:00 PM in Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council persons Jeff Berg, Tammy Hall, Tad Miller, Melanne Bang, Gail Shropshire. The March minutes were approved. A WCTA spokesperson informed the council of the procedures for a franchise for cable service to the City of Fertile. A public hearing will be held Tuesday April 20, at 7:00 PM in Fertile City Hall. Hall moved, Shropshire 2<sup>nd</sup> to begin the process of granting a franchise to WCTA for cable service. Passed. A Forest City Ambulance member answered questions regarding ambulance service to Fertile residents. Every resident has the right to inform 911 of the ambulance service they wish to call. Darrel Bang discussed the meeting to be held April 12, 2004 at the Worth County Courthouse regarding the Farm to Market Road. Beginning July 1, 2004, state legislation requires farm to market road through cities of less than 500 population be transferred to the county. Fertile has 3.76 miles of road. Of that, 1.82 miles are farm to market road. Fertile will lose related Road Use Tax Funds for the farm to market road. This will be transferred to the county. Mayor Russell and Warren Bruns will attend this meeting. Mr. Bang requested the Alley east of his property be vacated. The council agreed to investigate the procedure for alley vacation. Reports by officers and committees were given. The Fertile Wm. Rhodes Park sign will be removed from Highway 9. Kay Olson will advertise the old safe on Ebay. Hall moved, Miller 2<sup>nd</sup> to put a lien on two Fertile properties for Utility bills which have not been paid. Passed. Hall moved, Bang 2<sup>nd</sup> to approve February expenditures. Passed. Randy Bredeson is donating and installing basketball backboards and rims at the tennis court in the park. April 24 was designated as Park Clean up day. Everyone is invited to assist in clean-up activities. Meet in the Park. Meeting Adjourned.

## **Roller** Coaster

Roller-coasters have changed significantly since the first wooden commercial ride was constructed at Coney Island, New York, one-hundred, ten years ago. Welded steel tracks and restraining bars now make it possible to safely "enjoy" loops, corkscrews, and even backward maneuvers, whether the attraction has us on our feet or in our seats. Engineering has enabled the designers to frighten us out of our wits without endangering our lives.

Fifty years ago "Teed" Elthon and I read an article in the *Popular Mechanics* magazine about a "Back Yard Roller Coaster" and decided to build one. The plans called for a gently sloping wooden track on which, with the help of gravity, a cart could effortlessly roll. It sounded like fun, and we were *always* ready for fun. Our roller cart was a piece of wood about two by three feet which we had nailed together out of scrap lumber, and the track was made of available two by fours. Ball bearing roller skate wheels were to provide the movement. We bought eight of them from the Hegney Hardware Store, just across the garden from the Elthon home. Four wheels went on the bottom to hold the cart on the rails and the other four were mounted on the sides to provide free forward movement. We worked feverishly to finish the roller cart and to build the rails, and at last were ready for a trial run.

Fertile is flat for the most part, so we used the dog house in Teed's back yard to provide the elevation for the run. We placed a sack of cement on the cart at the top of the track and released the latch. All went quite well, but we discovered that the tracks had to be parallel to each other within a half inch or the side wheels would fall off the track. This was our "on the job" engineering training. Since the sack of cement made the run without spilling *its* contents we decided to trust *our contents* on the ride ourselves. Because we weighed more, we rolled faster than a bag of cement, but the ride was less thrilling than we had anticipated.

The ridge of the dog house was about three feet off the ground. We figured that if the cart could start at a higher point we could gain more speed and excitement. Across the alley the Elthons had a small chicken shed with a ridge *three times* higher than the dog house We moved our roller coaster and went from the dog to the chickens. The greater speed called for a longer run out, so we lengthened the tracks, applying all of our newly acquired engineering skills.

This worked wonderfully, and the ride was much quicker than our first effort. Something, it seemed, was still lacking. What was it? A dip! We thought that would be stimulating, and went to the Fertile Lumber Company to buy some one by two wood which we could bend for the sag in the track. The rails off the chicken coop became slightly steeper and higher as we made space for the dip, directly at the bottom of the ramp. When all was adjusted we sent the cart down the run with our test sack of cement as the only "rider." It hit the dip and jumped up and off the track. Our grasp of the dynamics of weight in motion was as lacking as our recently learned engineering skills were limited. We determined that the problem should solve itself and that the cart would stay on the track if we, being heavier than a sack of cement, rode it ourselves. Since the track was on Teed's turf he got to try it first. We pulled the cart to the top and he climbed on. We were both anxious to see the results of our ingenuity. He released the latch, came hurtling down the ramp, hit the dip, and demonstrated the inadequacy of our design. The single thickness, un-reinforced one by two strips snapped and the cart and Teed ploughed straight on through. Thankfully he wasn't hurt, although our pride didn't fare quite as well. We laughed like kids do when something goes amiss, and gave up on the idea of Fertile's first and finest roller-coaster. Weeks of anticipation came to a crashing stop, but we learned some valuable lessons on cooperation, problem solving, and the truth that anticipation is often more tasty than realization.

VANILLA CREAM BARS

From Olde Family Favorites by Eastern Star Members

**CRUST**:

5 tablespoons sugar

1/4 cup cocoa

1 egg, beaten

1/2 cup melted butter/oleo

1 teaspoon vanilla

2 cups crushed graham crackers

1 cup flaked coconut (optional)

1/2 cup chopped pecans

Mix sugar with cocoa; stir in remaining ingredients. Press into ungreased 9x13 pan; CHILL.

FILLING:

3 tablespoons milk

2 tablespoons vanilla instant pudding

1/4 cup plus 1 tbsp. melted butter/oleo

2 cups powdered sugar

4 squares semi-sweet chocolate Blend milk, pudding mix, 1/4 cup melted oleo and powdered sugar; spread on crust. CHILL.

Melt chocolate with remaining oleo/butter; spread over sugar mixture. CHILL. Cut into small bars; Keep refrigerated.
