The Fertile City Council met 7PM, September 7, 2004, at Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Jeff Berg, Paul Youngers, Melanne Bang, Gail Shropshire. Absent Tad Miller. Bang moved, Berg 2nd to sign a resolution designating Forest City Ambulance as ambulance provider for Fertile. Passed. Residents may go to the Sheriff's office and designate another provider. The city claims to FEMA have been approved and the City is waiting for the Check. The small red mill was discussed. Kay Olson offered to donate concrete to construct a base. It was decided to store the mill over the winter until the summer of 2005. Chris Andersen reported on the FB&I meeting held concerning the 150th celebration. Mayor Russell is Chairperson, Gloria Kirschbaum is assistant Chair and Rhonda Prescott is Secretary. Youngers moved, Bang 2nd to designate August 4, 5, & 6, 2006 as the date for the Fertile 150th celebration. As a fund raiser for the '06 celebration, a turkey supper is planned for November 6, 2004. Ruth Ouverson and helpers are planning the event to be held at the former Fertile Community Center. Joe Elthon has donated the use of the building. The Mayor's report was given, the driving bridge work is beginning. First Street South will be closed during construction of the new bridge. The city attorney is handling the concerns of the old cable company. Plans are to electrify the bridge lights this month. The clerk's report was given, Berg moved, Shropshire 2nd to approve the 03-04 Street Financial Report. Passed. Warren reported vandalism in the park. Names of residents of Fertile were painted inside the log cabin. A barrier is to be constructed to prevent persons from entering, but will still allow people to look inside. As of July 1, 04, ATVs are illegal to be driven on any street, street parking, or any public property. Persons observed driving an ATV on City property or Streets will be reported immediately to the Sheriff's office. Youngers moved to approve expenditures, Shropshire 2nd, passed. Monthly reports were given. Berg moved, Bang 2nd to adjourn the meeting.

Gang-related teen age "tagging" is a major problem in many of the cities of our fair country. Misguided "muralists" steal or purchase paint in spray cans and proceed to "tag" buildings, signs, buses, fences and walls with their names, gang logos or symbols. It is an exasperating problem which only gets worse when the owner of the defaced property doesn't promptly paint over the scribbles. Some cities in Southern California are addressing the problem by collecting and combining partially emptied cans and containers of unused paint. This provides a service to people who might otherwise have a problem disposing of the toxic waste. The resulting blend of the remnants turns out to be a dense battleship gray which will cover anything. This paint is given to building owners and organizations who use it to conceal the graffiti. It is an ingenious idea which helps to solve two of society's problems.

Not every new idea turns out so well.

During my growing up years in Iowa "trick or treating" on Halloween was a popular pastime. By the time we were teenagers we were less interested in pocketing the "treats" than in pulling off the "tricks." One mildly mischievous trick was "soaping" windows, the 1940's version of graffiti. We would buy or borrow a bar of Ivory soap and write on store or car windows. It was risky business to contaminate a man's castle with unwanted decoration, and many home owners hadn't replaced their screens with storm windows this early in the season. We knew better than to soap the screens. That caused them to rust, and would have been destructive and not tolerated. Most homes escaped the soaping.

Gunder and Mrs. Hegney owned and operated the hardware store across the street from the bank building. It had large plate glass display windows and the front of the building was right on the sidewalk. It was an easily accessible target for soaping and got "treated" every year. Most people realized that if they tried to wash off the soap they were in for a lengthy chore, but that the soap would rub off quite easily with crumpled newspaper. Apparently Gunder hadn't heard about this solution, and was sick and tired of trying to wash off the mess. This was when he came up with the bright idea of coating the window with raw linseed oil to foil the "soapers." He carried the oil in bulk for sale in the store, and brushed it onto the window "slick as a whistle." Oil made his windows impossible to soap. "Aha! I fooled them this time," he may have said to the "missus."

Fool us, he did, but he fouled up himself at the same time. After a couple of days in the bright sunshine and arid autumn air the oil dried to a tough wrinkled film that was nearly impossible to remove from the plate glass. It wouldn't wash off easily with water or any other solvent, and finally had to be laboriously scraped off with a razor blade. As I said, not every idea is as brainy as it seems to be when it first flashes across our minds. The Hegneys never oiled their windows again, and the kids in Fertile seemed to take it easy on those big plate glass panes on subsequent Halloweens. Maybe he did fool us after all.

AND we were the last generation that was so dumb as to think you needed a husband to have a baby! No wonder we are so confused, and there is such a generation gap today. BUT WE SURVIVED.

1 8X13 /Brownie Cake Mix

1 pkg. (10.5 oz.) Miniature Marshmallows 2 cups (12 oz.) semisweet chocolate chips

- 1 cup Creamy Peanut Butter 1 tablespoon butter or margarine
- 1 1/2 cups crisp Rice Cereal

Prepare brownie batter according to directions for fudge-like brownies. BAKE in greased 9x13 pan. 350° 28-30 minutes (do NOT over bake)

Top with marshmallows; <u>bake exactly 3</u> <u>minutes</u>. Marshmallows will not be completely melted. COOL on wire rack. In a heavy sauce pan combine chocolate chips, butter and peanut butter, over low heat, <u>stir until smooth.</u>

Mix well, cereal into chocolate mixture. Spread over cooled brownies. Refrigerate 1-2 hours or until firm, before cutting. (Use sawing method.)
