The Fertile City Council met 7PM, August 3, 2004, at Fertile City Hall. Present were Mayor Joyce Russell, Council members Jeff Berg, Tad Miller, Paul Youngers, Melanne Bang. Absent Gail Shropshire. Miller moved to approve the June minutes, Youngers 2<sup>nd</sup>. Passed. Youngers moved, Miller 2<sup>nd</sup> to designate the Forest City Ambulance as ambulance provider for Fertile. Residents may go to the Sheriff's office and designate another provider if they wish. Passed. Tom Morris of WestCom, discussed the cable service Fertile has had for the past fifteen years. Mr. Morris said he was unaware of the problems Fertile has experienced and said they would be corrected. He requested WestCom to be an alternate provider for cable TV. No action was taken. The City Attorney is reviewing the request. The Mayor reported City Insurance has paid for the Sewer vandalism, \$13,000.00 for a new pump. Two Catchers have been installed to prevent items reaching the pumps. The new pump also includes a grinder. The three-year-old pump is being repaired to have available as a back-up. The city claims to FEMA have been approved and the City is waiting for the Check. The Mayor has been attending county meetings regarding the Emergency Management position. A sharing agreement for the position is being considered with an adjoining county. The Morse Property was discussed and actions considered to remedy the problems with the property. Mayor Russell has been informed the driving bridge will be replaced this fall. Work will begin in several weeks. Bang moved to approve expenditures, Miller 2<sup>nd</sup>, passed. Monthly reports were given. Melanne Bang, chair of the events for Fertile Fun Days, gave a report on planned activities. Berg moved, Youngers 2<sup>nd</sup> to adjourn the meeting. Meeting adjourned.

Thank you to everyone who planned, participated or attended the activities of Fertile Fun Days.

All thirteen buildings are filled with authentic items that would have been found in the particular building in the 1800's. There are also a covered bridge and a swinging bridge. A picnic lunch was then served in a house overlooking the Mississippi River. After lunch the classmates went to De Immigrant, Fulton's authentic Dutch windmill, which was brought to America in 1999 and was dedicated in 2000. The windmill is a completely functioning mill; corn, rye, buckwheat and wheat are ground and the flour is sold in the gift shop at the base of the mill. The rest of the afternoon was spent as each couple wanted; some visited lock and dam #13 which is just north of Fulton.

At 5:30 the class met at the Best Western Frontier Motor Lodge in Clinton for dinner. After dinner each classmate told a little about his or her children and grandchildren. The class then were guests of Lukers who took them to see "Oklahoma" which was appearing on the stage of the Clinton Area Showboat Theatre, a professional summer stock theatre. Following the performance, the class returned to the Luker's home for dessert and conversation. At that time Gary Hall read a letter that had been read at Judy (Haugen) Hall's funeral.

### Little Wild Church in the Brown Wood Neil L. Kuns September 30, 1994

For longer than I can remember there have been at least two churches in Fertile, Iowa. The Lutherans worshipped in the west end of town, and the Christians in the east. Sometimes there was a third in mid-town, the Mission Hall, but although that group held Sunday school on a regular basis their worship services were intermittent. The Lutherans were the most staid of the three congregations. Some Mission Hall adherents thought they were more pious than anyone else in town, but others in their fellowship regularly proved this to be a misconception. The Christian Church was occasionally alive, but "enjoyed" too many part-time preachers during the thirties and early forties who were apparently "decaffeinated."

Insipid faith, like flavorless food leaves hungry people longing for something more tasty. Into Fertile's "faith-famine" came another congregation, offering excitement, life and the "real thing." From several of the churches in the area a few people gravitated to a small wooden building setting south of the limestone quarry. If they ever had a name they didn't publicize it well enough to impress it on my memory. Shouting and lying on the floor in various stages of spiritual or emotional ecstasy were regular expressions of whatever it was that possessed them or they possessed. Because of their Pentecostal preaching and practices everyone in town who wasn't attracted to their frenzied form of reverence referred to them as

Sixty miles down-stream another small lowa town named Nashua was known as the home of the "Little Brown Church in the Wildwood." It is a decorous little church with Congregational roots. We took their name, re-arranged the adjectives, and used it to refer to our excitable Pentecostal group as the "Little *wild* church in the *brown* wood."

Because the reported routines of this group were so radically different from anything the teen-agers in town had ever experienced we decided to see for ourselves if they actually did what was rumored. Conveniently they met on other nights than our own churches. This enabled us to investigate. None of us would have been caught dead actually going into their worship services, but one night we were almost caught looking in on their services through the windows of the building. A car-load of us who were tooling around town in Marlowe Floy's '35 Ford had coasted to a stop and, with our lights off, had parked on the road nearby. We quietly eased our way through the trees until we could look into the windows. Sure enough, people were lying on the floor in the center aisle. Amazed by the confirmation of the rumors we had received, we nervously giggled or laughed loudly enough to reveal our presence. They noticed us over their own noise, and charged for the door to disperse us. None of us had intended to disrupt their devotions, but inadvertently we had done so. In an effort to get away from the riled-up "rollers," we ran back through the trees toward the road and jumped into the seats or onto the running board of the car. Marlowe's driver's side wing window was broken. I reached through to grab onto something to steady myself as the car lurched away, and the jagged glass raked across a knuckle on my right hand. This was the only-real harm suffered that night by the either the "Christians" or the "lions."

I still carry a half-inch long scar on the second knuckle of my right thumb as a souvenir of that enlightening evening. Ask me about it sometime, and I'll show it to you.
